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## Introduction

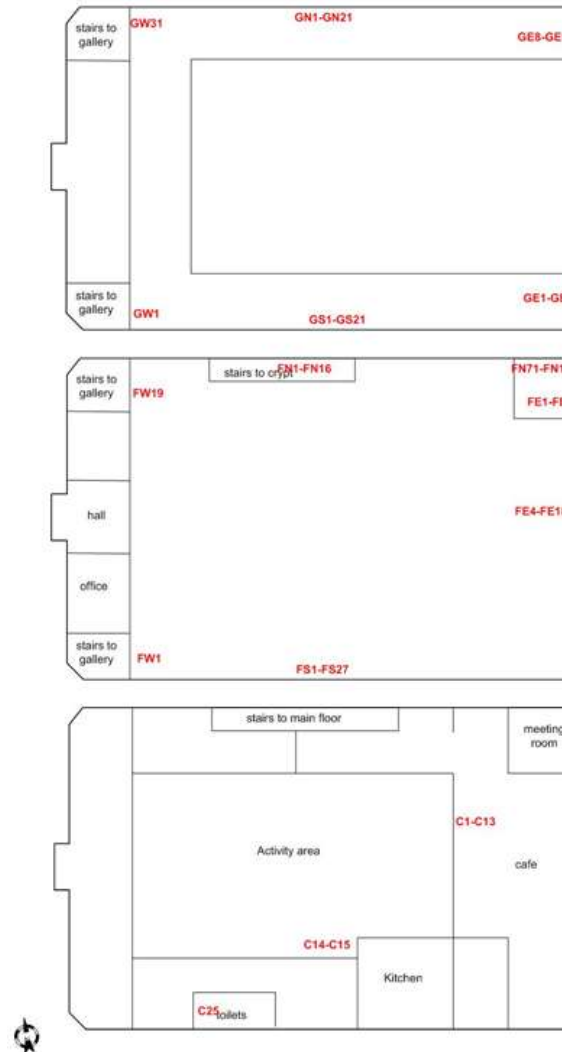
This document contains transcriptions of memorials inside the church of St Swithin's, Walcot, Bath. It is part of the documentation of burials for the parish of Walcot.

The church has an extensive set of memorials on three levels: the crypt, the ground floor and the gallery. The Saxon church was replaced by a new church in 1742 but this was pulled down and the current, larger church built opened in 1777. Nonetheless memorials from the previous buildings have survived and the oldest memorial is a mural plaque in the crypt which has a date of 1683.

In order to locate memorials, they have been assigned a letter to indicate the level, a letter for the wall (N/S/E/W) and a sequence number. The levels are indicated by:

- C crypt
- F main floor of the church
- G the gallery

The sequence numbers are arbitrary. For the southern and western walls, the numbers start in the south-western corner. For the northern wall, the numbers start in the north-western corner. For the eastern wall the numbers start in the south-eastern corner.
