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






Introduction

The church was opened in 1867 and had a cruciform shape. In 1912 a south aisle was added and the nave extended to the west. In 1913 a baptistery was added at the western end and in 1914 a vestry added.

It is Grade II listed with the following given as the reasons:


- A good example of a mid-C19 church designed by local architects Hickes and Isaac and sensitively extended in the early C20 by Mowbray A Green
- Good survival of internal fitting including the memorial tablet to Rev. Doudney, the reredos and the stained glass windows,
- Good group value with St Luke' Vicarage and the Church Hall.

There are only a few wall memorials.



From the Bath Chronicle of Thu 19 Dec 1867 p3:

CONSECRATION OF ST. LUKE'S CHURCH

The new church of St Luke's, Lyncombe, was consecrated on Monday afternoon. The scheme for building the church was set on foot in November, 1864, when a meeting was held in the schoolroom of South-hill House at which a resolution was unambiguously agreed to affirming that "better and convenient Church accommodation is desirable for the large and increasing district lying south of Holloway, comprising Devonshire-buildings, Entryhill, Cottage-crescent, and Odd Down." The site selected for the erection is very conveniently situated for the district mentioned, and, as we stated some time ago, it is the same that was named some 60 or 70 years ago when a similar project was mooted. The foundation stone was laid on the 11th May, 1866, by the Rev. Prebendary Kemble, Rector of Bath, and the church has occupied about 15 months in building. It is in the Early Decorated style with nave, chancel, and transept and when completed there will be a tower and spire, running, it is intended, to a height of 120 feet. The architects were Messrs. Hickes and Isaacs, who furnished the designs gratuitously, and Mr. T. W. Gibbs rendered legal assistance without charge; Mr. E. Hill was the contractor the carpenter's work was entrusted to Messrs. Smith and Son, and the plastering and painting to Mrs. Molle. The interior presents an unassuming appearance, though not unpleasing. There are 384 sittings and of these one third are free and unappropriated. The pulpit and the reading desk as well as the font are in consonance with the building itself, and the altar cloth and communion service partake of the same simple character. The

incumbent of the church is the Rev. J. A. Watt, B.A. The committee concerned in its erection were the Rev. J. W. Sproule, vicar, the Rev. C. Kemble, the Rev. W. C. Osborn, Colonel Griffiths, Messrs. J. Green (treasurer), H. Spackman (secretary), T. W. Gibbs, Dr. Hensley, T. W. P. Isaac, W. C. Jameson, J. Hickes, C. Cross, and J. H. Drew. These are the responsible committee, and, while admitting that these gentlemen have done all they could, we cannot refrain from giving to the ladies of the parish and many others in the city, too many for us to attempt to mention them, an acknowledgment of their share in the good work. The total cost of the church, purchase of the land, &c., is, we believe, £2150, which is not wholly subscribed, and to build the contemplated tower and spire will entail a further expenditure of £250.

The officiating bishop at the consecration service on Thursday was Dr. Anderson, of Clifton, who acted for Lord Auckland, the Bishop of the diocese, whose ill-health prevents his fulfilling those duties, the discharge of which by his lordship has always been the source of so much gratification to his people. The clergy met at Devonshire-cottage, the residence of Mr. J. Green, who entertained them to luncheon, and from thence they walked in procession to the church. As they proceeded up the aisle the Bishop and the clergy read alternately the familiar verses of the 24th Psalm, and then his lordship laid upon the altar the documents connected with the conveyance and endowment of the building, proceeding to read the prayers specially provided for services of this character. At the conclusion of this portion of the service the sentence of

consecration was read by the Registrar, and it was signed by the Bishop who thereupon directed that it should be enrolled and preserved among the muniments in the registry. The usual order of afternoon prayer was then proceeded with, the officiating minister being the Rev. J. A. Watt, the incumbent. The Psalms of the day were the 84th 122nd, and 132nd. The first lesson (1 Kings viii. 22--62) was read by the Rev. Prebendary Kemble, and the second (Hebrews x. 19-26) by the Rev. J. W Sproule. The anthem was from the 34th Psalm, "O taste and see that the Lord is good," the choir being composed principally of the members of the choir of St. Matthew's Widcombe, though there were, we understand, several singers other than those connected with the last named amongst it.

The Sermon was preached by Bishop Anderson, who selected for his text the 9th verse of the 1st Epistle to the Corinthians:-"For a great and effectual door is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries." St. Paul, the preacher observed, had in his day opened a great number of doors to individuals than any one since. In the consecration of a new church a great door and an effectual one was opened, and in that modest and beautiful structure they had surely the continuation of the thoughts they had used in the service :- "Lift up your heads, O ye gate; and be ye lift up ye everlasting doors: and the King of glory shall come in." Was it not too a continuation of the thoughts they had used in prayer and those they had just joined in singing? Imagination would fail to reckon the blessings which might be obtained by the fervent worship within those walls. There would be an open door as often

as each supplication was devoutly uttered—as often as God's our truth was set forth. How many a fervent prayer, how much exalted praise, how much listening to God's word, how many souls would be ripened with grace, and great as had been the first note of prayer, the first note of praise the first proclamation of God's word, he felt the responsibility of uttering it. He only occupied the place of another, their own beloved Bishop, who was unable to be with them on account of infirmity, but he was with them in spirit though not in person. It would be a delightful thought to him that another church had been added to the diocese, and that in that place God's name would be proclaimed from generation to generation. Secondly, the period in which they lived was especially an age of opportunities, for there were open doors and very many of them. There were the open doors of usefulness at home. What a number of churches had been built and restored in late years, and no class of the community was now forgotten. But then there was as well the door open to then through their colonies, amongst their own countrymen and fellow-Christians, and did not the thought often strike them that their service was beginning as their own ceased, so that God was praised from the rising of the sun till the going down of it. Then again there were the heathen, as instanced in his late diocese, which was made up of the heathen and the colonists side by side, their churches very near each other, continually worshipping together partaking of the memorial of the same dving Lord together, and looking forward to living hereafter together in their heavenly home. But there were many millions of them still unconverted, and was not that an open door for them? The Bishop proceeded then to this third head - "there are many adversaries." They had hoped that their faith had been established, and that they were country rooted and grounded in it; but was there not a cloud of doctrine upon the

inspiration od the blessed Word? Was there not a cloud when men thought that they would recommend themselves to their Maker, and that there was no need of the precious blood of Christ to cleanse from sin? Was there not a cloud on their spiritual worship, for had there not been in some quarters worship into which were introduced forms scarcely different from that if the corrupt church? Churches could be pointed out, they might be far from that one, where there were forms of worship that character. Was there not a view of the priesthood which detracted from the glory of the blessed Saviour as the one perfect and sufficient sacrifice? Might God preserve amongst them the simplicity of their pure worship, praying with the spirit and the understanding. Again were there not hundreds around them plunged in sin and apathy, especially in the metropolis and their large centres of population? Many centuries had elapsed since the period of the happy Reformation, and yet still very many forsook the place of worship, and rejected the Saviour's name. Was there not a loosening of the obligation to keep God's holy day a greater amount of desecration of the Sabbath than there was 20 or 30 years ago? Assuredly this must lead to an increase of iniquity around them, and let them pray to God that there might be a more holy observance of His day throughout the length and breadth of his land. Another hindrance was the towering pretensions and vaunting of the Church of Rome. Be it theirs to be content to worship as their forefathers had worshipped, not to forget those who had suffered even unto death that they might hand down to them a pure faith and preserve to them an open Bible.

The contribution in aid of the funds amounted to £101 8s. The Mayor of Bath, who wore his robe of office, Alderman Thompson, and Alderman Barrett, M.D., were present and took part in the procession.

Notes

- 1 St Mark's Church had been consecrated in 1832 as the parish church for Lyncombe. Its location hadn't taken into account the development of the housing in South Lyncombe and then Oldfield Park which occurred from the mid-1800s and continued from 1899 with the houses on Poets' Corner on the site of Holloway Farm.
- 2 In the History of St Mark's Church, Bath (1911) by A G Cole: "About the year 1870, a new parish was formed for the district of South Lyncombe, with St. Luke's as its Parish Church, the mother church of St. Mark's being allowed £1,000 as compensation (which sum was eventually devoted towards the building of the Vicarage), each Incumbent, until it was built, receiving the interest of the money towards his house rent."
- 3 The article states that "There are 384 sittings and of these one third are free and unappropriated." This is a reference to the practice of renting pews as a means of generating income for the incumbent. Nonconformist chapels, such as Widcombe Baptist Church, made a virtue of the fact that all its sittings were free. In 1914 the vicar of St Mark's, Rev M E Weldon, called the practice of pew rents a 'scandal', and had it suppressed in his church, for which he was compensated (Bath Chronicle 14-Jul-1914 p3).

- 4 In the sermon the recent building of churches is mentioned and "and no class of the community was now forgotten". This is partial acknowledgment that nonconformist churches had gained popularity amongst the working-class. His Majesty's Commissioners for Building New Churches had been established in 1820 to address this.
- 5 A section of the sermon refers to the 'Church of Rome' and the need of Anglicans to keep their 'pure' form of worship. For decades various Anglican clergy had been campaigning against the resurgence of Catholics in England following the Roman Catholic Relief Act of 1829. The Act had repealed the Test Act of 1672 and a series of other penal laws. The Test Act specified that noone but people taking communion in the established Church of England were eligible for public employment including holding an office under the Crown (such as a military officer), being a councillor or being a member of Parliament. The Catholic church of St John the Evangelist, South Parade was consecrated in 1863.
- 6 The Lord Auckland, Bishop of Bath and Wells, referred to was Robert John Eden (1799-1870), 3rd Baron Auckland.
 - Rev Dr Anderson, of Clifton was David Anderson (1814-1885). He had been bishop of Rupert's Land, Northern Canada 1849-1864 an area originally owned by the Hudson Bay Company and named after Prince Rupert of the Rhine, the first head of the company.
 - Rev J W Sproule was James William Sproule (1812-1881) the vicar of St Mark's from 1856 to his death in 1881.

From the Bath Chronicle of Sat 25 Oct 1913 p3: ST LUKE'S CHURCH DEDICATION OF THE NEW NAVE AND BAPTISTRY

Saturday, being St. Luke' Day, the Bishop of Bath and Wells undertook the ceremony of the dedication of the new nave and baptistery of the church of St. Luke's South Lyncombe, now undergoing rebuilding and enlargement to meet the pressing needs of this rapidly growing part of Bath. For years it has been evident to Church people in the district that St. Luke's Church would have to be either enlarged or rebuilt. The latter scheme has been adopted as being the more practicable and calculated to provide the most satisfactory results. During the vicariate of the Rev. C. E. Doudney great advances have been made to bring to fruition the desires of the congregation. Taking his courage in both hands the Vicar boldly faced the needs of the situation and his optimism and dauntless courage have been rewarded. He has been aided in his efforts by the parishioners in a most liberal and generous manner. The old nave has been replaced by one twice its size, providing additional seating accommodation for 200 persons and making the total capacity of the church 580.

The work has been designed and carried out by Mr. Mowbray A. Green, architect, and the builders have been Messrs. Chancellor and Sons. The nave has been built of Bath stone and roofed with Colombian pine. It was found necessary in consequence of the rebuilding, to remove the pulpit from the right-hand side of the chancel to the left-hand side. Many of the pews installed to provide the additional seating accommodation formerly belonged to the old Bath College Chapel. The church is lighted by electricity, the installation having been carried out by Messrs. Kendall and Sons, of Milsom Street. The baptistry to the west-end, contains a

one-light memorial window, and the Spender memorial window, of four lights, containing the figures of the four Evangelists, St. Matthew, St. Mark, St, Luke and St. John, has been surmounted with some very handsome tracery work, which adds greatly to the effectiveness of the window. It now only remains to rebuild the chancel, that it may harmonise with the work just accomplished. When this work is carried out, St. Luke' Church will be the best in the city.

DEDICATION OF BAPTISTRY WINDOW

In the afternoon the Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells unveiled and dedicated a new stained glass window in the baptistry. This window, which is onelight, represents the Good Shepherd holding a babe in His arms, and at His side is a second child. It is dedicated by the Bishop "To the Glory of God and in loving memory to two little ones, Noelle Mary Doudney and David Hardress Waller." Noelle Mary Doudney was a daughter of the Vicar (the Rev. C. E. Doudney), and died about seven years ago, aged two and a half years., and David Hardress Waller was the son of Canon E. H. N. Waller, of London, and a former C.M.S. missionary in India, and a nephew of the Vicar. He died in infancy at St. Luke's Vicarage a year ago. At the foot of the window are the words: "He shall gather the lambs in His arms." At the dedication service the Bishop was attended by the Vicar, who carried the Bishop's crozier, and the Rev. A. Chisholm (curate of St. Luke). A celebration of the Holy Communion followed, the Bishop being the celebrant.

This evening will take place the ceremony of the dedication of the nave and baptistery of the new church.

DEDICATION OF NAVE AND BAPTISTRY

There was a very crowded congregation at the dedication service who took place in the evening and in addition to a number of robed clergymen, there were also many prominent lay members of the

Church from various parts of the city present in the congregation. A special order of service was provided. At the outset the Bishop offered certain petitions at the south-west door of the church, after which the choir and clergy, with the Bishop following, proceeded to the chancel singing the hymn, "the God of Abraham praise."

From the Bath Chronicle of Sat 55 Jul 1919 p7:

The Rev. H. W. Doudney (Vicar of St. Luke's, South Lyncombe) reminds his parishioners, in his parish magazine for July, that it was decided by the vestry meeting to erect a window and tablet of names, in memory of the men from that parish who have laid down their lives in the war. This, he says, will eventually be used as the east widow of the side chapel when the church is completed. The design, which is a most beautiful one, is now on exhibition in the south porch of the church. It is hoped that it will be possible to unveil the new window on St. Luke's Day. The estimated cost is £350.

From the Bath Chronicle of Sat 22 Nov 1919 p7: ST. LUKE'S WAR MEMORIAL RECTOR OF BATH DEDICATED A STAINED GLASS WINDOW

On Sunday afternoon, Preb. S. A. Boyd (Rector of Bath) unveiled and dedicated the window which has been placed in the south transept of St. Luke's, South Lyncombe, in memory of those connected with the parish who perished in the war. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who had hoped to perform the ceremony, was too unwell to officiate. There was a large congregation.

The congregation included Alderman Sir Harry Hatt, Lady Hatt, Miss Alice Hatt, and Miss Margaret Hatt.

The window has three lights. The centre is occupied by a knight in armour, typical of Faith. The left side bears the design of an angel comforting a mourning woman, in token of "Hope." The small lights above contained scrolls bearing the words, "Honour, Glory, Might, Power." At the bottom are placed the Royal Arms, flanked by the Union Jack. The design is completed by two small representations of a battleship and an aeroplane.

At the foot of the window are the words: "In grateful memory of the men of this parish who gave their lives for King and Country."







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
