

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### Introduction



The church of St Saviour, Larkhall

The parish of St Saviour's, serving Larkhall, was originally part of Walcot parish. The church opened in 1832. It did not have its own registers until 1840 and burials in the period 1832-1840 are in the Walcot register, but without an indication of burial place.

The Bath Chronicle of Thu 25 Oct 1832 reported the burial of Rear-Admiral Volant Vashon Ballard stating that "He was buried Thursday last in the crypt of St Saviour's new church, Walcot, the first interment which has taken place there." During the inquiry into the state of burial grounds reported in the Bath Chronicle of Thu 26 Nov 1857 it was stated for St Saviour's "there is a well-formed crypt in which interment is limited to close relationship. ... The number of funerals during the past year was only four".

#### From the *Bath Chronicle* of Thu 3 May 1832 p2: CONSECRATION OF ST. SAVIOUR'S CHURCH WALCOT

This building, which rivals in elegance that much admired structure St. Mary's, Bathwick, was consecrated on Saturday. In point of architectural beauty, both externally and internally this church is generally considered to be unrivalled by any ecclesiastical structure of modern date in this part of the country. Mr. Pinch was the Architect. The Tower forms a very object to the surrounding beautiful neighbourhood. It is elegantly proportioned, and consists of three stories, the angles being ornamented with graduated octangular buttresses, surmounted with pinnacles decorated with sunk panels, crockets, and finials: the whole to the height of 120 feet. The interstices of the windows are ornamented with perforated quatrefoils. The upper part of the tower terminates with great richness and delicacy. The exterior of the side walls of the church are flanked by bold buttresses finished with crocketed pinnacle, between which are five windows filled with elegant tracery. The former and the walls of the choir are surmounted with perforated parapets. The interior of the church consists of three divisions, a choir, and two side aisles, the latter of which are provided with galleries. The choir is separated from the side aisles by five lofty pointed arches on each side, springing from clustered pillars, the ceiling of which is elevated above the former, and groined; the ribs and bosses producing an elegant effect. In the design of the east window, together with the pulpit, reading desk, and altar piece, the architect has been very successful, and the whole form as a termination, the tout ensemble of which presents a striking effect from the western entrance. Beneath the floor of the church is a spacious, dry, and well-aired crypt for interment.

In celebration of the day a flag was hoisted on the tower, and the bells, eight in number, presented by Wm. Hooper, esq; were rung in lively and beautiful peals during the morning. Shortly after 10 o'clock, a very numerous body of the clergy and laity assembled at the house of Mr. Geary, the senior churchwarden of Walcot, in Grosvenor-place, whence they walked in procession to the church, preceded by the boys of the Blue Coat School, the monitors of the National School, and the Brown School. The Bishop arrived shortly afterwards, and the consecration service having been performed, the prayers were read by the Rev. H. C. Crook, the appointed minster; after which an excellent and appropriate sermon was preached by the Rev. C. M. Mount, Prebendary of Wells, from xix Leviticus, v.30: "Ye shall keel my Sabbaths and reverence my Sanctuary." . . .

At the conclusion of the service, the Bishop, Clergy, and numerous gentry returned to Mr. Geary's house at which a handsome cold collation was provided at the joint expense of that liberal and public spirited gentleman, and his active colleague, Mr. Howe.

Lord James O'Brien having expressed the delight which he felt at the service in which they had that day been engaged, avowed his firm and decided attachment to the Established Church of this kingdom and concluded by proposing the health of the Lord Bishop and the Clergy of the Diocese.

The inquiry into the state of burial grounds in Bath which took place in November 1857 led to an order that the crypt of St Saviour's be closed. However


burials continued there until at least 1891 with 46 burials in the period 1858-1891.



There are about a ninety internal memorials as wall plaques. Of these, the majority are of the same general form as a white marble shield on a black background.

Coffin was named a justice of the peace and a judge in the Inferior Court of Common Pleas. In 1812, he was named to the New Brunswick Council. Coffin raised the New Brunswick Fencibles during the War of 1812. In 1819, he was given the rank of full general. In 1817, Coffin moved to England but he retained his position on the New Brunswick Council until 1828. He later returned to New Brunswick and died in Westfield Parish. ## **Crypt**

Access to the crypt is by an external door at the eastern end of southern side of the church. Steps lead down to an area with boilers for the heating. There are lights.

The burials are arranged between the vaulted supports which run west to east with 5 places at floor level and then three shelves, with two of these having 5 places and the topmost three, sometimes five. Each grouping therefore has the potential for 20 places. Each burial place is 2' (60cm) high and 30" (75cm) wide although those at the top are smaller because of the curve of the vaulting. The covers have incised inscriptions of between two and seven lines. Some inscriptions have deteriorated but many are legible. At various places there are gaps which lead to an area which might have further burials. This was not explored.





The burials do not extend to the walls of the church and, in gaps, it is possible to see the void between the tombs and the walls. There is no ready way of accessing the voids without finding a gap on the shelves. It possible that there may be further burials there. Not all spaces are filled.

For numbering, given that the top row may contain differing numbers, I have taken the bottom left-hand side as number 1, with the bottom row as 1-5, the next row up 6-10 etc. The bays are numbered 1 in the south-eastern corner (the first on the left-hand side) up to 4 on that side, and then 5-10 with 10 opposite the stairs.

The form of the names n the monument are, as with most such, as initials and surname. This monument, however, doesn't given rank and regiment.

In order to establish the full names of the individuals the lists of those who died in WWI, in particular the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and references in the *Bath Chronicle*, have been consulted. In most cases this has been successful.

The late Bill Hanna, who documented many war memorials in Bath, has pointed out that the process of putting together the list of names for the war memorials tended to be an informal one and depended on names being submitted and people recollecting the names of people they knew had died. So the *Bath Chronicle* of Sat 15 Sep 1917 has a sub-heading of 'Larkhall Soldier Killed in Action' and refers to Private George Albert Lockyer, of the Gloucestershire Regiment, but his name does not appear of the memorial at St Saviour's.

Distinguishing between 'C' and 'G' on the memorial requires particular attention.

String, who would have been 33 years of age in May next, was born in Bath, and had lived here practically all his life, He served his pupil teachership at South Twerton, following which he went to Cheltenham Training College, and thence to a mastership at a Church of England School at Glossop. From this he returned to succeed Mr. Noad as headmaster of St. Saviour's School, where his short period of tenure had been very successful.  Soon after the outbreak of war Mr. Strong went to India with the Somerset Light Infantry and after twelve months passed his qualifying examination as an officer, and returned to England to take up his commission. For a time after returning, he was stationed near Plymouth and for six or eight months he was at Bovington Camp, near Dorset. At his own request he was then sent to Nigeria, being posted to the Nigerian Regiment.  He left England in October last, and proceeded at once with his regiment to take part in the campaign in German East Africa, where he has now made the supreme sacrifice. Since his departure his parents have only received one communication from him, a postcard which arrived a week ago. He has two brothers in the Army, Sergt Edgar Strong, R.A.M.C., now stationed at a hospital in London, and Bombardier Arthur Strong, R.F.A., who has been serving in France for two years.

The gallant young officer was 25 years of age. His nephew, Sapper John Burt, of the Wessex R.E., who was badly wounded at Salonika, being shot in the stomach, has been discharged from the Army, being totally incapacitated, after a long period in hospital.
